Meet Begins Thanksgiving Day



HALLANDALE BEACH, FL – Gulfstream Park’s acclaimed Championship Meet, highlighted by the \$3 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) and \$1 million Pegasus World Cup Turf Invitational (G1) Jan. 25 and the \$1 million Curlin Florida Derby (G1) March 29, will launch its 2024-2025 season Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28 and run through March 30, 2025.

The Championship Meet, the winter home of the top horses, horsemen and jockeys in the world, will play host to a total of 66 stakes races – 30 graded – totaling \$15.025 million. Opening weekend begins with 2-year-old turf stakes Thanksgiving Day and Friday, Nov. 29, and the \$600,000 finals of the Florida Sire Stakes Saturday, Nov. 30.

Pegasus World Cup Day will offer eight stakes races – seven graded plus two overnight handicaps – totaling \$5.55 million. Along with the \$3 million World Cup and \$1 million World Cup Turf, the day will also feature the \$500,000 Pegasus Filly & Mare Turf Invitational (G2), \$200,000 Inside Information (G2)

for fillies and mares, the \$200,000 W.L. McKnight (G3) for 4-year-olds and up and \$150,000 La Prevoyante (G3) for 4-year-olds and up fillies and mares, both at 1 ½ miles on the turf, and the \$150,000 Fred Hooper (G3) for 4-year-olds and up at a mile on the main track.

The \$150,000 Gulfstream Park Turf Sprint, for 4-year-olds and up on the turf, is expected to draw a crowd as are two overnight handicaps run on Gulfstream’s Tapeta track – the \$100,000 Carousel Club and \$100,000 South Beach.

In just eight years the Pegasus World Cup and Pegasus World Cup Turf have hosted Horses of the Year in Gun Runner, California Chrome, Knicks Go and Bricks and Mortar, as well as two-time Longines World’s Best Racehorse Arrogate. The race has also attracted runners from England, Ireland and Japan, as well as the world’s most noted celebrities and entertainers.

The Curlin Florida Derby highlights 10 stakes totaling \$2.5 million – five graded – including the \$250,000 Gulfstream Park Oaks (G2) for 3-year-old fillies, two 1 ½ mile turf events in the \$200,000 Pan American (G2) for older horses and \$150,000 Orchid (G3) for fillies and mares, and the \$150,000 Ghostzapper (G3) for 4-year-olds and up on the main track.

The Florida Derby continues to be the leader in establishing classic winners. There have been 46 Florida Derby starters that have won a remarkable 59 Triple Crown events, including 25 Kentucky Derbys.

Meanwhile, last winter's Gulfstream Park Oaks produced Alabama (G1) winner Power Squeeze, Test (G1) winners Ways and Means, Black-Eyed Susan (G2) winner Gun Song, and Monmouth Oaks (G2) winner Scalable.

Two big days with major preps for the spring classics lead up to the Curlin Florida Derby.

On Feb. 1, the \$250,000 Holy Bull (G3) is the featured event of a five stakes program that includes

three other graded races - the \$150,000 Forward Gal (G3) on the main track, \$150,000 Kitten's Joy (G3) and \$150,000 Sweetest Chant (G3) on turf, both contested on the turf.

The final preps for the Curlin Florida Derby and Gulfstream Park Oaks is March 1. The nine stakes program – eight graded - is led by the \$400,000 Fountain of Youth (G2), won by Belmont (G1) and Haskell (G1) winner Dornoch last winter, and \$200,000 Davona Dale (G2).

Gulfstream's renowned 3-year-old series begins Jan. 4 with the \$150,000 Mucho Macho Man followed by the Holy Bull, Fountain of Youth and Florida Derby.

The 3-year-old filly series begins Jan. 1 with the \$100,000 Cash Run at a mile, followed by the Forward Gal, Davona Dale and Gulfstream Park Oaks on Derby Day.

Gulfstream's turf course will offer a plethora of opportunities for all horses during the Championship Meet. In December 3-year-olds and up will have

the \$100,000 H. Allen Jerkens at two miles and the \$200,000 Fort Lauderdale (G2) at 11/8 miles, while 3-year-olds and upward will have opportunities in the \$150,000 Suwannee River (G3) at a mile and the \$100,000 Abundantia at five furlongs.

From January through March, older turf horses and fillies and mares will each have eight turf stakes available at a mile or more. Five of the eight in both divisions will be graded. Turf sprinters will also have plenty of opportunities. Fillies and mares will contest the \$125,000 Ladies Turf Sprint and \$100,000 Captiva Island while 4-year-olds and up will contest the Gulfstream Turf Sprint and \$100,000 Silks Run.

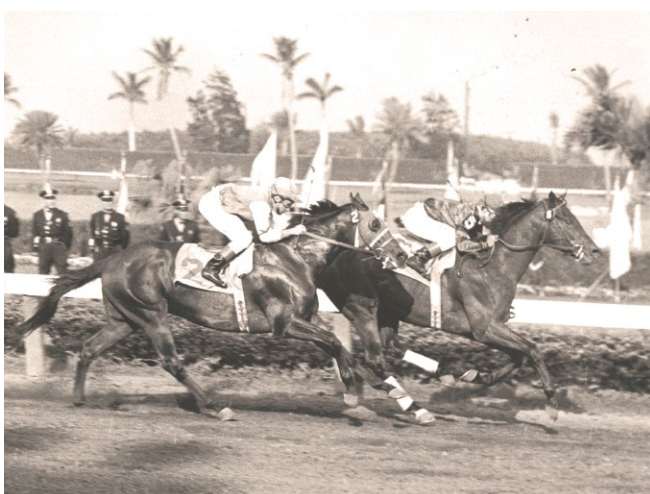

BEGINNINGS

1939

Gulfstream Park offered its first thoroughbred racing card on Wednesday, February 1, 1939, when Candar jumped out of the gate on top and romped to an easy 3 1/2-length victory in the first race. An estimated crowd of 18,000 wagered \$224,287 after Sonja Henie, the Norwegian 3-time Olympic champion figure skater and newly turned Hollywood film star, cut the ceremonial ribbon. Jack Horning, a 28-year-old Miami contractor and heir to a Pittsburgh steel fortune, had been credited with pulling off a near miracle getting the track operational for opening day. Gulfstream Park had risen from an empty field along U.S. 1 in just 48 days. The track conducted only four of 40 scheduled days of racing due to financial problems that shuttered the facility for nearly five years.

1940-1943

Closed

1944

Gulfstream Park reopened on December 1, 1944. James Donn Sr., owner of Exotic Gardens and one of the creditors left unpaid when the track closed in 1939, stepped in to take over the reins and operated a 20-day meeting with an average attendance of 4,434 and an average handle of \$281,902.

1947

Armed, Thoroughbred racing's biggest attraction rebounded from a stunning fifth-place finish in the Santa Anita Handicap with a track-record performance in the \$25,000 Gulfstream Park Handicap, easily beating stablemate Pot o' Luck by a measured length under a stranglehold by jockey Doug Dodson. Armed shaved more than four seconds off the track record with his 2:01 2/5 clocking despite never having been allowed to fully exert himself.

1948

Rampart, a 6-year-old mare, became the first of her sex to win the Gulfstream Park Handicap, defeating defending champion and reigning Horse of the Year Armed.

1949

Coaltown set a track record for 1 1/4 miles while winning the \$20,000 Gulfstream Park Handicap in 1:59 4/5. After setting sprint-like fractions of :22 3/5, :45, 1:09 and 1:34 1/5 (a fifth of a second faster than the mile world record), Coaltown was eased up as he crossed the finish line seven lengths ahead of Three Rings. Carrying high weight of 128 pounds, including jockey Ovie Scurlock, Coaltown was timed in 1:59 4/5, equaling the world record shared by Shannon II (Golden Gate Fields) and Saint Andrews II (England).

1952

The Florida Derby was inaugurated on March 15, 1952, when an 18-horse field was assembled for the 1 1/8-mile stakes for 3-year-olds, requiring four horses to line up outside the 14-stall starting gate. Sky Ship, ridden by Ronnie Nash, prevailed by a head over Handsome Teddy. Sky Ship was sent to post at 11-1 and surely would have paid more than \$24.10 had he not run in an entry with Closed Door, who finished a never-threatening sixth. Both horses carried the blue and white colors of Brookmeade, owned by Dodge automobile heiress Mrs. Isabel Dodge Sloan. The first Florida Derby Day at Gulfstream was attended by 17,915 who wagered \$1.3 million on a nine-race program. The clubhouse and a grandstand addition were constructed.

1953

The Florida Derby became the first stakes to carry a \$100,000 purse in the history of thoroughbred racing in the Sunshine State. Money Broker, a 15-1 longshot, won by a head to collect a winner's share of \$88,000 from a total purse of \$133,750. Dark Star, who finished 13th, went on to win the Kentucky Derby. Crafty Admiral successfully defended his Gulfstream Park Handicap title.

1955

Nashua captured the \$148,750 Florida Derby on March 26, 1955, but the 4-5 favorite of a crowd of 24,873 made it interesting. Nashua was reserved off the early pace before making a sweeping move around the turn to get the lead in mid-stretch. Just as he was putting away pacesetter First Cabin at the eighth-pole, Nashua, apparently thinking his job was done, suddenly tried to prop. With late-closing Blue Lem bearing down, Arcaro got Nashua's mind back on running just in time to eke out victory by a neck. Nashua went on to finish second behind Swaps in the Kentucky Derby before winning the Preakness and Belmont Stakes.

1956

Swaps set a world record of 1:39 $\frac{3}{5}$ for a mile and 70 yards in the Broward Handicap while conceding 8-25 pounds to his rivals as the 130-pound highweight. Needles closed from 14th and last to be a popular winner of the \$145,400 Florida Derby. He went on to become the first Florida-bred horse to win the Kentucky Derby.

1957

Gen. Duke equaled the world record of 1:46 $\frac{4}{5}$ for 1 $\frac{1}{8}$ miles under Bill Hartack while defeating heavily favored Bold Ruler in the \$123,600 Florida Derby. Bardstown became the first to carry 130 pounds to victory in the \$126,600 Gulfstream Park Handicap.

1958

Round Table had to carry 14-22 pounds more than his rivals in the Gulfstream Park Handicap that attracted 25,389, the largest attendance in two years. Even that huge concession in weights wasn't sufficient to make the race competitive, as Round Table rallied to overtake front-runner Meeting in mid-stretch and draw away to a four-length win under 130 pounds. Ridden by Bill Shoemaker, who was nursing a leg injury suffered in a spill at Santa Anita two weeks earlier, Round Table ran the 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ miles in 1:59 $\frac{4}{5}$ to equal the track record set by Coaltown in the 1949 Gulfstream Park Handicap. In the Florida Derby, heavily favored Tim Tam rallied late to prevail by just a half-length over 75-1 pacesetter Lincoln Road. Tim Tam went on to win the Kentucky Derby and Preakness.



Needles became the first Florida-bred horse to win the Kentucky Derby.

TURF & A NEW ERA

1959

Gulfstream opened its world acclaimed turf course. Woody Stephens-trained One-Eyed King won the first running of the Donn Handicap, which was inaugurated at 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles on turf. Easy Spur followed up victories in the Hutcheson and Fountain of Youth with a three-quarter-length victory over Sword Dancer in the Florida Derby. Favored at 4-5, Easy Spur was jockey Bill Hartack's third consecutive success in the Florida Derby. Trainer Arnold Winick wrapped up his first of 12 Gulfstream training titles.

1960

Bally Ache and Venetian Way sparked a hotly contested rivalry in the 1960 Florida Derby. After beating Venetian Way by a nose in Gulfstream's signature race, the two colts reversed positions in the Kentucky Derby. Bally Ache went on to win the Preakness. Woody Stephens-trained Bald Eagle captured the Grade 1 Gulfstream Park Handicap on his way to a year-end championship.

1961

James Donn Jr. became president of Gulfstream. What was at the time the world's largest tote board was erected in the infield.

1972

Gulfstream awarded choice "middle" dates (January 17-March 2) for the first time. The richest purse schedule in Florida history (\$3.4 million) was offered and the Florida Derby became the state's richest race when its value was raised to \$125,000-added.

1978

Doug Donn, following the death of his father, James Donn Jr., was elected Gulfstream Park president.

1979

Gulfstream set a record for handle, \$94,568,590, during its 44-day meeting. A one-day handle record of \$3,641,157 was set Florida Derby Day. New mutual machines were installed, giving patrons the ability to bet and cash any amount at the same window.

1980

Jockey Angel Cordero Jr. set a meeting record with 60 winners.

1981

A state handle record was set with \$103,531,722 for 50-day meeting. Single-day mark of \$4,090,109 established on Florida Derby Day.

1983

Record \$104,049,307 bet at 50-day meeting. Single-day mark upped to \$4,568,618.

1985

50-day meeting handle record set with \$114,940,056. Florida Derby Day handle, a record \$5,008,579. One Pick 6 ticket returns \$289,793.60. Takeout on multiple horse wagers cut from 22 to 20%.

1986

Handle for 50-day meeting again set record with \$114,995,640.

1989

For the first time, Gulfstream staged the \$10 million Breeders' Cup as part of its "Ultimate Weekend of Racing" Friday, Saturday and Sunday, November 3-5. Highlights included Sunday Silence and Easy Goer in the Classic, and Bayakoa in the Ladies' Classic.

1990

Bertram and Diana Firestone, then-owners of Calder Race Course, purchased Gulfstream. The 90-day meeting produced a record \$167,552,397 handle. The Florida Legislature passed the Inter-Track Wagering (ITW) bill. Bill Shoemaker rode Beau Genius, the last winner of his brilliant riding career, to victory in the Hallandale Handicap.

1991

The Donn Handicap was selected the inaugural race in the American Championship Racing Series. The meeting handle set a record \$179,532,495. Gulfstream Park Racing Association Inc., owner of Gulfstream Park, was acquired from Catoclin International Racing Corp. by Gulfstream Holdings Inc., a subsidiary of Orient Corp. The acquisition was completed on December 27.

1992

For the second time, Gulfstream hosted the \$10 million Breeders' Cup program, again staging a three-day "mini" meet. The total handle of \$79,790,369 for the Breeders' Cup 10-race program was a North American record for a single day's betting.

1993

The handle for the 68-day meeting was \$248,661,887 - largest in Florida history. Wagering from simulcasting boosted that total to \$387,019,482. Julie Krone was leading jockey with 96 wins.

1994

Gulfstream enjoyed the most successful meeting in Florida history. For the 62 days, the total from all sources (commingled and non-commingled) was \$560,962,021. Holy Bull won the Florida Derby and would go on to be named Horse of the Year.

1995

Cigar was the story at the 63-day meeting, winning the Donn and Gulfstream Park handicaps en route to an undefeated season and Horse of the Year honors. Thunder Gulch captured the Florida Derby and Fountain of Youth Stakes and later took two-thirds of the Triple Crown. Jockey Jerry Bailey won seven races on March 11 (Florida Derby Day) erasing the mark of six set by Charlie Burr in 1953. A record total mutuel handle of \$622,039,493 was wagered.

1996

Cigar continued his winning streak (it would reach 16) with a smashing score in the Donn Handicap, his season debut. Unbridled's Song turned in a tour de force to win the Florida Derby and Jerry Bailey notched a second consecutive title by winning five races on the meet's final day to edge Shane Sellers, 97-96. Bill Mott captured his fourth consecutive training title and Frank Passero Jr., second in the standings, set a North American record by sending out 14 consecutive winners, shattering the old mark of nine.

1997

The introduction of full-card simulcasting helped set records in average daily handle, total commingled handle, on-track handle, ITW handle and ISW handle.

1998

Increases in on-track attendance and handle continued Gulfstream's upward swing, with the on-track wagering total of \$133,517,034 establishing a record. Fans were treated to performances by five Eclipse champions, Skip Away, Favorite Trick, Buck's Boy, Escena and Banshee Breeze, during the 63-day meet. Jerry Bailey regained his spot as Gulfstream's leading rider and Bill Mott notched his sixth consecutive trainer's title.

1999

The tone for the meet was set from the start, with an opening-day attendance record of 31,831 established January 3, and by the end of the meet, wagering from all sources topped the \$700 million mark. Jorge Chavez (91 wins) and Frank Passero Jr. (29 wins) topped the jockey and trainer standings, respectively. In September, Gulfstream was sold to Magna Entertainment Corp. and from November 5-7, played host to its third Breeders' Cup meet. Total wagering on the November 6 program exceeded \$100 million, then an all-time North American record.

2000

Local favorite Hal's Hope captured the Florida Derby. Jockey Jorge Chavez (77 wins) and trainer Bill Mott (30 wins) took titles in their respective categories.

2001

Monarchos put in a dominating performance in the Florida Derby, then became the 19th Florida Derby performer to capture the Kentucky Derby. Jerry Bailey won 13 stakes during the 63-day meeting to best his own record by one.

2002

The 90-day meet featured a plethora of superlative performances, among them Hal's Hope's triumph in the Gulfstream Park Handicap on March 30. The win made Hal's Hope, who captured the 2000 Florida Derby, the only horse in Gulfstream history to win both events. Bill Mott saddled 32 winners and won his ninth Gulfstream training title in 10 years, while Edgar Prado topped the Gulfstream standings for the first time, winning with 82 mounts. Palm Meadows, MEC's state-of-the-art training center, opened in November.

2003

Gulfstream established a Florida record for pari-mutuel handle with a total of \$825.3 million wagered during its 89-day season, a meet which saw the introduction of the Sunshine Millions. The Sunshine Millions pitted Florida-breds vs. California-breds for \$3.6 million in purses at Gulfstream and Santa Anita. The inaugural was attended by more than 36,000 fans at the two tracks and was covered nationally by NBC. Eibar Coa won his first Gulfstream jockey championship with 91 winners.

2004

Within days of the conclusion of the meeting, Gulfstream Park began work on a massive renovation project that dramatically altered the look of the facility, ushering in a new era of racing and entertainment. The old grandstand and clubhouse were leveled in July; the main track was enlarged from a mile to 1 1/8 miles, and the turf course was widened from 80 to 170 feet. Todd Pletcher won his first of a long string of training titles at Gulfstream. On November 2, voters statewide approved Amendment 4, which altered the Florida Constitution, authorizing the slots question to be placed on the ballot in Dade and Broward counties.

2005

Temporary structures were used during the 2005 meet as work progressed on the state-of-the-art clubhouse. Trainer Nick Zito saddled High Fly and Noble Causeway for 1-2 finishes in the Florida Derby. On March 8, Broward County voters passed an initiative allowing slot machines to be placed in its four existing pari-mutuel facilities.

2006

Barbaro took the Holy Bull and the Florida Derby during the Gulfstream meet. He went on to win the Kentucky Derby by a wide margin before sustaining a catastrophic injury in the Preakness that would claim his life after a valiant struggle. On January 4, Gov. Jeb Bush signed the slots bill into law.

2007

Reigning Horse of the Year Invasor overcame a stumble midway around the final turn to win the Donn Handicap before going to Dubai to win the World Cup. Development partner Forest City began construction of Phase 1, the retail aspect, of The Village at Gulfstream Park. Thoroughbred racing and slot machines mixed for the first time in the state of Florida when the meet opened January 3.

2008

Big Brown was the big story, winning the Florida Derby from post No. 12 by five lengths and, five weeks later, winning the Kentucky Derby. The colt would win two-thirds of the Triple Crown before being defeated in the Belmont Stakes. Ginger Punch and Sugar Swirl were a dynamic distaff duo for owner Frank Stronach. Ginger Punch, the champion mare of 2007, won the Sunshine Millions Distaff while Sugar Swirl became the first to sweep Gulfstream's three stakes for older female sprinters – the First Lady, Hurricane Bertie and Shirley Jones.

2009

Quality Road, owned by Edward Evans and trained by Todd Pletcher, set a track record in winning the Florida Derby over stablemate Dunkirk. Breeders' Cup Mile winner Kip DeVille beat Breeders' Cup Turf winner Red Rocks in the Gulfstream Park Turf.

2010

For only the sixth time in the Florida Derby's 59-year history, the 1 1/8-mile event is determined by a head when Ice Box rallied from last in an 11-horse field to beat Pleasant Prince. Ice Box would finish second in the Kentucky Derby. Quality Road returned to Gulfstream to break his own track record when winning the Donn Handicap by a record 12 3/4 lengths after starting his 4-year-old season with a win in the Hal's Hope. Todd Pletcher-trained Super Saver became the fifth Kentucky Derby winner in eight years to winter and train at Palm Meadows.



A BRIGHTER FUTURE WITH THE STRONACH GROUP

2011

Big Drama, the winner of the 2010 Breeders' Cup Sprint and Eclipse Award, set a track record for six furlongs while winning the Mr. Prospector (G3) in 1:08.12. Little Mike became the only horse to win three graded stakes during the 79-day meeting while capturing the Appleton (G3), Canadian Turf (G3) and Fort Lauderdale (G3). Dialed In closed from far back to win the \$1 million Florida Derby (G1), giving trainer Nick Zito and owner Robert LaPenta back-to-back victories in Gulfstream's signature race. The Rainbow 6 wager was instituted and the pool climbed to \$5.018 million on the next to last day of the meeting, when the mandatory payoff resulted in 1,311 winning tickets worth \$3,279.26 each.

2011-2012

Jockey Javier Castellano scored his 3,000th career victory on his way to capturing the riding title with a record 112 winners. Take Charge Indy, trained by Pat Byrne, led from gate-to-wire to win the \$1 million Florida Derby. Fountain of Youth winner Union Rags, who finished third, would go on to win the Belmont Stakes. The Florida Derby generated record handles for the state-of-the-art facility, where \$2.9 million was wagered on-track and the all-sources handle climbed to a record \$26.7 million.

2012-2013

Orb prepared for his Kentucky Derby victory with scores in an allowance race, the \$400,000 Fountain of Youth (G2) and the \$1 million Florida Derby (G1). Itsmyluckyday, who finished second in the Florida Derby, also won two important stakes: the \$100,000 Gulfstream Park Derby and the \$400,000 Holy Bull (G3). Point of Entry defeated 2011 Kentucky

Derby winner and eventual Dubai World Cup winner Animal Kingdom in the Gulfstream Park Turf Handicap (G1). The Eclipse Awards Dinner was held for the first time at the Sport of Kings facility at Gulfstream. The Claiming Crown was held for the first time at Gulfstream Park and spurred a 66-percent betting increase over the previous season's opener.

2013-2014

The 75th anniversary meeting was highlighted by Constitution narrow victory over Wildcat Red in the \$1 million Florida Derby on a card that generated all-time record handles. A total of \$26.8 million was wagered on the Florida Derby Day program, eclipsing the 2013 record of \$24.6 million and representing an 8.96 percent increase. In addition, the \$36.469 million wagered during the two-day Florida Derby Weekend broke the 2004 record of \$36.064 million. Bill Mott-trained Lea emerged as a blossoming handicap star with his second stakes score of the meeting with his win in the \$500,000 Donn Handicap in the track-record time of 1:46.86. Earlier on the Donn Handicap undercard, two-time champion Groupie Doll, the two-time Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Sprint (G1) champion, made a spectacular exit from racing in the Hurricane Bertie (G3). The Eclipse Awards returned to Gulfstream. Jockey Javier Castellano captured a record 132 races during the Championship Meet to notch his third straight title and third straight 100-win season, and Todd Pletcher comfortably claimed his 11th straight Champions Meet title while saddling eight graded-stakes winners. The inaugural summer meeting that began on July 1 proved to be a huge success.

2014-2015

The 76th Championship Meet at Gulfstream Park was highlighted by Materiality's front-running victory in the 64th running of the \$1 million Florida Derby (G1) on March 28. The Todd Pletcher-trained colt withstood a strong stretch challenge by Holy Bull (G2) winner Upstart to win Gulfstream's signature race in only his third lifetime race, matching the accomplishment of stablemate Constitution, who captured the 2014 Florida Derby with only two prior starts. Constitution returned in 2015 to capture Gulfstream's premier event for older horses, the \$500,000 Donn Handicap (G1) on February 7. Pletcher dominated the trainer standings with 46 trips to the winner's circle to capture his unprecedented 12th consecutive Championship Meet title. Jockey Javier Castellano notched his 4000th career victory when he capped a three-win day on February 8 to achieve the milestone aboard Captain Stan in the 10th race. Castellano continued his winning ways to capture his fourth straight Championship Meet title and fourth-straight 100-win season in a row. Ken and Sarah Ramsey took their fourth straight owner title with 23 trips to the winner's circle. Castellano,



Pletcher and the Ramseys were all honored for their 2014 achievements at the 44th annual Eclipse Awards dinner, held in Gulfstream's Sport of Kings facility. Gulfstream Park became the new home of the Florida Sire Stakes in 2014, when Jacks or Better Farm and trainer Stanley Gold extended their respective races won records to 16 in the stakes series for horses sired by stallions standing in Florida. In July 2015, Gulfstream Park also welcomed the Summit of Speed, a \$1.175 million program of nine stakes, including two Breeders' Cup 'Win & You're In' events, the \$250,000 Smile Sprint (G2, won by Favorite Tale, and the \$250,000 Princess Rooney (G2), captured by Merry Meadow.

2015-2016

The \$1 million Florida Derby (G1) continued its tradition of Triple Crown success in 2016. Reddam Racing's Nyquist maintained a perfect record while winning Gulfstream's signature race by 3 1/4 lengths – an impressive performance that propelled him to victory in the Kentucky Derby (G1) five weeks later. The Doug O'Neill-trained 3-5 favorite, who became the first West Coast shipper to win the Florida Derby since Empire Maker (2003), was ridden by Mario Gutierrez. Nyquist's triumph was worth a record \$1.6 million, including a \$1 million bonus from Fasig-Tipton. The 14-race program highlighted by the 1 1/8-mile feature event generated a Florida Derby Day handle record of \$32,082,270. The big day punctuated a banner 2015-2016 season that generated a record all-sources handle of \$807 million, a 15-percent increase over the 2014-2015 record handle of \$704 million. The average daily handle for the 2015-2016 meet reached a record \$9.55 million, up from the 2014-2015 average of \$8.1 million. Todd Pletcher extended his domination of the trainer standings with an unprecedented 13th consecutive title with 62 victories, while Javier Castellano won his fifth straight riding title with 113 wins. Cathryn Sophia registered a pair of dazzling

triumphs, overwhelming her 3-year-old filly rivals by 5 1/2 lengths in the Forward Gal (G2) and by seven lengths in the Davona Dale (G2), before going on to win the Kentucky Oaks (G1).

2016-2017

Highlighted by memorable editions of the \$1 million Florida Derby (G1) and the \$12 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1), the 2016-2017 Championship Meet registered a record all-sources handle of \$867 million for the 87-day session. Always Dreaming captured the Florida Derby by five lengths before going on to score a 2 3/4-length victory in the Kentucky Derby five weeks later. Always Dreaming gave trainer Todd Pletcher his most important victory of a meet during which he claimed his 14th straight title. In the inaugural edition of the Pegasus World Cup, Bob Baffert-trained Arrogate validated his No. 1 world ranking with a stunning 4 3/4-length victory in the ground-breaking event that also attracted California Chrome, the 2014 Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner who was named 2016 Horse of the Year in January during the Eclipse Awards Dinner in Gulfstream's Sport of Kings Theater. Luis Saez claimed his first Championship Meet title with 102 trips to the winner's circle.

2017-2018

The 89-day Championship Meet once again generated a record handle of \$957 million, representing a 10.4 percent increase over the previous season. Record handles were also achieved on the \$16 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) program January 27 (\$41.9 million) and the \$1 million Florida Derby (G1) card (\$49.9 million) March 31. Gun Runner closed out a remarkable career with a 2 1/2-length triumph in the Pegasus World Cup two days after being named 2017 Horse of the Year at the Eclipse Award ceremony in Gulfstream's Sport of Kings facility. Trainer Todd Pletcher, who won an unprecedented 15th straight training title, captured

his fifth Florida Derby when Audible rolled to a three-length score in the premier Triple Crown prep. Heart to Heart, trainer Brian Lynch's fan-favorite turf runner, notched his first Grade 1 success in the Gulfstream Park Turf (G1). Trainer Shug McGaughey notched his 2000th career victory in style, reaching the milestone with Fly So High's triumph in the Davona Dale (G2) March 3. Luis Saez captured his second straight Championship Meet riding title with a record 137 winners. Saez rode seven winners on a card twice during the meeting, sharing the all-time Gulfstream record with Tyler Gaffalione, who had set the record in July, and Hall of Famer Jerry Bailey. Gulfstream became the first track outside Latin America and the Caribbean to host the \$600,000 Clásico Internacional del Caribe. The featured \$300,000 Clásico del Caribe was won by Jala Jala, ridden by Irad Ortiz Jr.

2018-2019

The \$9 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1), won by Breeders' Cup Mile champion City of Light, was supported by the inaugural running of the \$7 million Pegasus World Cup Turf Invitational (G1), captured by Bricks and Mortar, in the \$16 million Pegasus World Cup Championship Invitational series. Maximum Security remained undefeated while winning the \$1 million Florida Derby (G1) before going on to prevail by 1 3/4 lengths in the Kentucky Derby, only to be disqualified. Undefeated Mexican Triple Crown champion Kukulcan registered a 10 1/4-length triumph in the \$300,000 Clásico del Caribe, while stablemate Jala Jala returned to Gulfstream to win the Copa Confraternidad del Caribe. Trainer Jorge Navarro captured his first Championship meet title, ending Todd Pletcher's unprecedented streak of 15 consecutive titles. Irad Ortiz Jr. rode 135 winners, edging two-time defending titlist Luis Saez by one winner. Jockey Tyler Gaffalione notched his 1,000th winner at Gulfstream aboard Mission From Elle in a maiden race.

2019-2020

Gulfstream Park, through strict protocols developed in communication with government and health officials, blazed the trail for the safe continuation of racing in the midst of the global COVID-19 pandemic. The 69th Florida Derby (G1) was run without spectators but with spectacular results. Sackatoga Stable's Tiz the Law captured the Triple Crown's premier prep by 3 ¾ lengths on his way to victories in the Belmont (G1) and Travers (G1), while a record \$53.8 million was wagered on the Florida Derby Day card. Peter Callahan's Swiss Skydiver, the 3 ¼-length winner of the Gulfstream Park Oaks (G2) that day, went on to beat the boys in the Preakness Stakes (G1), as well as score in the Alabama (G1) and Santa Anita Oaks (G2).

Earlier during the Championship Meet, Mucho Gusto, who won the \$3 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) and Zulu Alpha, who captured the \$1 million Pegasus World Cup Turf Invitational (G1), thrilled fans at Gulfstream January 25.

2020-2021

The \$3 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) headlined a spectacular day of Thoroughbred racing in January. Korea Racing Authority's Knicks Go, coming off a track record-breaking victory in the Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1), carried his brilliant speed over 1 ½-miles to score a definitive 2 ¾-length triumph over Jesus' Team, the locally based Jose D'Angelo trainee who had also finished second in the Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile. Robert and Lawana Low's Colonel Liam made an auspicious stakes debut while winning the co-featured \$1 million Pegasus World Cup Turf Invitational (G1) by a neck over Largent, his fellow Todd Pletcher trainee. Colonel Liam went on to win the Munoz Memorial (G2) at Fair Grounds and the Turf Classic (G1) at Churchill Downs in his next two starts. Pletcher went on to saddle St. Elias Stable's Known Agenda for a victory in the Florida Derby (G1) in March, notching his record sixth

success in the Gulfstream's premier Triple Crown prep race. Pletcher claimed his record 18th Championship Meet title with 58 trips to the winner's circle. Known Agenda was Irad Ortiz Jr.'s Championship Meet record-breaking 138th winner. The three-time titlist finished the meet with 140 winners.

2021-2022

Life Is Good pulled off a 3 ¼-length victory over defending champion Knicks Go in the \$3 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) Jan. 29. The Todd Pletcher-trained 4-year-old son of Into Mischief, who captured the Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1) at Del Mar, ran 1 ⅛ miles in 1:48.91 under Irad Ortiz Jr. Ortiz also guided defending champion Colonel Liam to a length victory in the \$1 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational Turf (G1). Ortiz had notched his 3000th career victory in North America Feb. 24 aboard Order and Law. Jose Ortiz rode Chad Brown-trained Regal Glory for a 2 ½-length victory in the \$500,000 Pegasus World Cup Filly and Mare Turf Invitational (G3). Saffie Joseph Jr., who unseated 18-time titlist Todd Pletcher to claim his first Championship Meet title, saddled White Abarrio for a 1 ¼-length score in the \$1 million Curlin Florida Derby (G1) April 2, giving jockey Tyler Gaffalione his first victory in the premier Triple Crown prep. Luis Saez, who had captured back-to-back Championship Meet titles in 2016-2017 and 2017-2018, regained supremacy among jockeys with 122 wins, dethroning defending three-time champ Irad Ortiz Jr.

2022-2023

Life Is Good pulled off a 3 ¼-length victory over defending champion Knicks Go in the \$3 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) Jan. 29. The Todd Pletcher-trained 4-year-old son of Into Mischief, who captured the Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1) at Del Mar, ran 1 ⅛ miles in 1:48.91 under Irad Ortiz Jr. Ortiz also guided defending champion Colonel Liam to a length victory in the \$1 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational Turf (G1). Ortiz had notched his 3000th

Pegasus World Cup (G1) for Hall of Fame trainer Bill Mott on Jan. 28. ... Three Diamonds Farm's Atone rallied to win the \$1 million Pegasus World Cup Turf (G1) for trainer Michael Maker during Gulfstream Park's annual celebration of World Class racing and entertainment. ...Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners and Gary Barber's Queen Goddess posted a 1 ½-length victory in the \$500,000 Pegasus World Cup Filly & Mare Turf (G3) for trainer Michael McCarthy, who saddled City of Light for a Pegasus World Cup victory in 2019. ... Saffie Joseph Jr. repeated as leading trainer in Races-Won with 47 trips to the winner's circle, while 18-time Championship Meet titlist Todd Pletcher led all trainers with more than \$3.95 million in Purses-Won. ...Irada Ortiz Jr. reclaimed the Championship Meet riding title with 128 wins after his three-year reign was broken by Luis Saez in 2021-2022. Ortiz led all jockeys with more than \$7.5 million in Purses-Won.

2023-2024

National Treasure, the 2023 Preakness Stakes (G1) winner, provided Hall of Fame trainer Bob Baffert his third success in the \$3 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational (G1) Jan. 27. Baffert had previously found the Pegasus winner's circle with Arrogate (2017) and Mucho Gusto (2020)...Hall of Fame trainer Todd Pletcher scored his record-extending eighth victory in the \$1 million Curlin Florida Derby (G1) after saddling Fierceness, the 2023 2-year-old champion, for a stunning 13 ½-length romp...Danny Gargan-trained Dornoch captured the Fountain of Youth (G2) and went on to win the Belmont Stakes (G1) at Saratoga...Irada Ortiz Jr., who rode 119 winners, won the Championship Meet riding title for the fifth time in the past six seasons while making a successful defense of his 2022-2023 title...Saffie Joseph Jr. collected his third straight Championship Meet training title following Hall of Famer Todd Pletcher's 18-year reign. Joseph saddled 66 winners....Ken Ramsey claimed the owner title with 27 winners.

Palm Meadows, regarded as the finest Thoroughbred training center in North America, continues to be fertile ground for developing champions of all ages and on all surfaces.

Palm Meadows, the innovative, world-class training facility owned by The Stronach Group, is a sprawling 286-acre facility located in Palm Beach County 45 miles north of Gulfstream Park.

Kentucky Derby winners Animal Kingdom (2011), Super Saver (2010), Big Brown (2008), Street Sense (2007) and Barbaro (2006), as well as Funny Cide (2003), all took up winter residence at Palm Meadows, as did Horse of the Year and Breeders' Cup winners Bricks and Mortar (2019), Invador (2006), Saint Liam (2005) and Ghostzapper (2004).

Other noteworthy residents have included Belmont Stakes winners Dornoch (2024) Tonalist (2014), Palace Malice (2013), Union Rags (2012), Ruler On Ice (2011), Da' Tara (2008), Jazil (2006) and Birdstone (2004); Travers winners V.E. Day (2014), Alpha (2012),

Stay Thirsty (2011), Afleet Express (2010), Street Sense (2007), Bernardini (2006) and Flower Alley (2005); multiple Grade I winner Quality Road, and juvenile champions Good Magic (2017), Shanghai Bobby (2012), Uncle Mo (2010) and War Pass (2007).

Palm Meadows has drawn rave reviews since opening Nov. 29, 2002. The facility has a seven-furlong, 176-foot wide turf course, a 1 1/8-mile main track and a one-mile jogging path. Its 40 barns, which each contain 36 stalls, accommodate a total of 1,325 thoroughbreds.

Trainer Tom Albertrani has called Palm Meadows the "best Thoroughbred training center I have ever been to." Trainer Barclay Tagg echoed Albertrani's sentiments: "I believe it is, without doubt, the best Thoroughbred training center in North America." Jockey Alan Garcia has referred to Palm Meadows as "horse heaven."

The on-site facilities at Palm Meadows have been designed to be environmentally friendly while using

renewable resources. One of the structures at Palm Meadows houses a compost system that turns manure into nutrient-rich organic matter while being odorless and noiseless. Similar systems are in place in Europe, but this is the first of its kind to be employed in the U.S.

After the stalls receive their daily cleaning, the waste is collected, loaded on a truck and taken to the compost building, which is large enough to house not only a football field but the bleachers as well.

The living quarters at Palm Meadows are unparalleled. There are 32 rooms for trainers, each containing one bed, a full kitchen and bathroom, a living room, dishwasher, laundry facility, microwave and heating/air conditioning. Phone service is available, and there is a common-area cafeteria, an employee lounge and a trainers' lounge.

There are also furnished grooms' quarters for 208 (double occupancy) featuring heating and air conditioning, private shower, sink, a laundry facility and more.

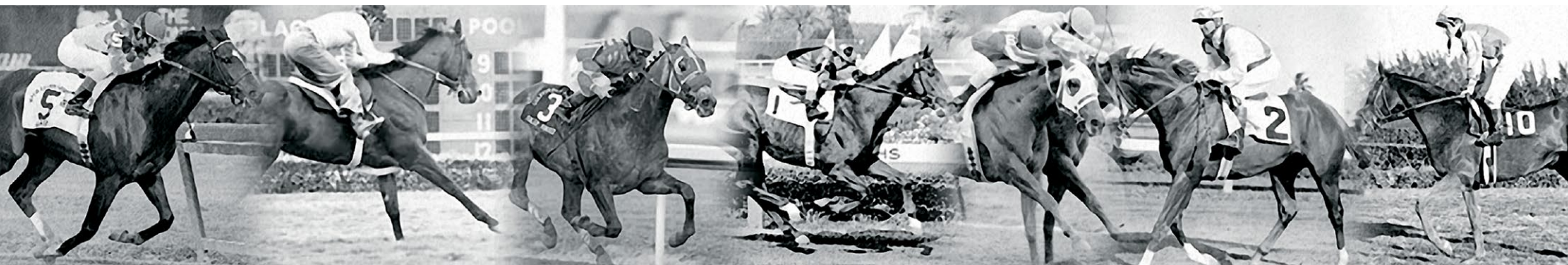

John Legend and Rick Ross are making a music video. Frank Sinatra and Raquel Welch are filming a movie.

Post Malone, Jimi Hendrix, Thomas Rhett, Cyndi Lauper, Frank Zappa are performing.

Yes, that's Mel Brooks telling one-liners in Ten Palms.

Joe Torre, Joe Pesci, David Cassidy and Rashard Lewis are leading their horses into the winner's circle. Mia Farrow, Lou Holtz, Erin Brockovich and Geraldo Rivera are guest speakers. Don Shula, Bob Griese and Larry King come to hang.

While Gulfstream has seen Thoroughbred racing's



biggest stars on its track, it's also been a magnet for celebrities in the sports and entertainment worlds.

That's never more evident than in late January when Gulfstream plays host to the Pegasus World Cup Invitational

Series. Celebrities attending Pegasus have included Pharrell Williams, Lenny Kravitz, Bella Thorne, Usher, Karolina Kurkova, Prince Royce, Ludacris, Aaron Paul, Gene Simmons, Hudgens, Mike Ditka, DJ Cassidy and Emmanuelle Chriqui.

You really don't know who you might bump into on any given day at Gulfstream Park. And the trail of celebrities starts on opening day, February 1, 1939.

In an attempt to attract attention to its first Thoroughbred racing program, original Gulfstream owner Jack Horning used part of the \$1.4 million he spent to build the track on having film star and three-time Olympic figure skating champion Sonja Henie cut a ceremonial ribbon to open the racing surface.

In 1947, three years after Gulfstream reopened under the Donn family, Babe Ruth and his wife Claire spent the afternoon at Gulfstream. Ruth, recuperating from throat surgery and weakened by cancer, would give an emotional speech just a week later when the

Yankees hosted 'Babe Ruth Day' at Yankee Stadium.

In 1966, Jackie Gleason filmed his popular television show at Gulfstream, while in 1967 Frank Sinatra and Raquel Welch spent a day at Gulfstream filming scenes for the comedy-thriller 'Lady In Cement' with co-stars Richard Conte and Lainie Kazan. Sinatra and Welch were filmed sitting in the stands and the beginning of a race with Gulfstream emblazoned on top of the starting gate was used in the film's official trailer.

One of the most memorable events at Gulfstream occurred in May of 1968 when the track hosted what some will argue was the precursor to Woodstock - The Miami Pop Festival. Promoted by Michael Lang - who a year later would create and promote Woodstock - The Miami Pop Festival drew approximately 60,000 fans over two days to listen to a lineup that included Hendrix, Zappa, John Lee Hooker, The Crazy World of Arthur Brown, Chuck Berry and NRBQ. Linda Eastman, the future wife of Beatle Paul McCartney, also attended the event.

Ken Davidoff, who worked as a photographer for the Palm Beach Daily News, recalled: "The stage was on two flatbed trucks facing west (on the apron). Hendrix played at night, and he was wearing these blue velvet pants and told me I couldn't take flash pictures of him. Because it rained most of the second day, only three bands played. But everyone stayed at The Castaways hotel and they had a huge jam session there."

Terry Adams, a founding member of NRBQ who along with Bill Frisell composed the score for the 2018 film "Change in the Air," recalled the band wasn't part of the festival lineup. "We just wanted to go to the concert," Adams said. "So we walked up to the gate with our equipment and said, 'We're NRBQ.' And the guy opened the gate and let us in. We rescued Chuck Berry that night. He wasn't happy

with his backup band so, while he was playing, we tapped each member of his backup band on their shoulder, took their instruments, and we slowly became his band.”

While the first day ended with a tremendous fireworks display, the second day brought four inches of rain and the show was canceled after only a few acts played. Noted producer and engineer Eddie Kramer recalled in the book ‘The Road to Woodstock,’ that while he pulled away in a car from Gulfstream during the second day’s torrential rain, Hendrix, sitting in the back seat of the car, wrote ‘Rainy Day, Dream Away.’

From the 1960s through the 1980s, marching bands, parachutists, water skiers and circus performers were present during Florida Derby Day. There was also a Miss Florida Derby beauty pageant and Florida Derby Ball. One of the greatest spectacles on Derby Day was the animal races. One of those to participate in the races was jockey Mickey Solomon.

“I rode a few,” Solomon recalled. “You name it they raced it. I don’t even remember what I rode, zebras, donkeys. Rode an ostrich...that was not fun. They were nasty suckers to get on. But they came in with



different animals every year.”

Gulfstream also worked with a number of spokespersons in the 80s and 90s, including Joe Namath, Larry King, Tony Curtis and Julie Krone. But as Gulfstream went through ownership and management changes in the 1990s, it also changed direction in marketing. Trying to figure out how to attract a younger audience to the track, Gulfstream started promoting concerts behind its grandstand.

“I think Gulfstream was always ahead of its time in marketing going back to the 1950s,” former president Douglas Donn said. “We started the animal races, which was in Sports Illustrated and newspapers all across the country. The activities on Derby Day were designed to attract people who wouldn’t come to horse racing. It was also about publicity, because it got back to the racing dates and the fact we were in a competitive situation (with Hialeah Park). So we made an effort to get more people here even if it didn’t make economic sense. We became very aggressive.

“As far as the concerts, we advertised to bring new people here but it never happened. They were tuning us out. So what we did was we brought in acts and for the \$2 admission charge to the track you would get to see the concert. We did it during the races so we could show a little film, hold a seminar and hand out vouchers designed to get people interested in racing. We did a poor job of explaining to the horse community what the purpose and intent of having the shows during live racing was. That was our fault and, yes, it was an inconvenience. We didn’t expect someone who had never been to the track to walk in and bet \$100. It was a long-term strategy.”

On some days, when the track hosted the likes of Bryan Adams, Styx, the Beach Boys, Yes, Huey

Lewis and Cyndi Lauper (who told of walking hot in New York), Gulfstream was crowded with as many as 20,000 people. But if the concerts were creating new race fans, it never showed in the handle numbers, despite a parade of acts that also included the Little River Band, Richie Havens, Art Garfunkel, Joan Jett, Davey Jones and David Cassidy.

Sports stars have always had an appreciation of Thoroughbred racing’s equine and human athletes. NHL Hall of Famer Denis Savard is a regular winter guest. Don Shula, Bill Parcells, Joe Torre, Paul Hornung, Michael Irvin, Don Zimmer, Jimmy Johnson, Bill Kilmer, Paul LoDuca, Nick Buoniconti and Sam Huff have all attended the races, as have retired NFL stars Wes Welker, Vince Wilfork and Jonathan Vilma. Rashard Lewis, a member of the NBA champion 2012-2013 Miami Heat, visited the winner’s circle twice during the Championship season after two horses he co-owns with Jake Ballis - Cigar Street and White Rose - won races.

At Gulfstream Park

Even Shaquille O'Neal made it to Gulfstream, donning jockey silks (and rather large silks) to shoot a commercial in the winner's circle.

Joe Pesci visited Gulfstream several times in 2004 to watch a filly he owned named Pesci compete in the Sunshine Millions. Academy Award-winning actor Don Ameche attended the 1989 Breeders' Cup, while Mel Brooks and Anne Bancroft attended the '92 edition. Comedians Shecky Green, Pat Cooper and David Brenner have performed at Gulfstream or enjoyed the races and actor Matt Damon has visited Gulfstream's poker room on numerous occasions, slipping in-and-out of the building in what is known as the 'Damon Stairwell.'

Rock and Roll Hall of Famer Dion attends the races each winter with friends. Another Rock and Roll Hall of Famer, Stephen Stills, spent a day in the Director's Room several years ago, the guest of former racing secretary Bobby Umphrey, talking about music, racing, and the enormous Thoroughbred he rode on the cover of a past album entitled, 'Thoroughfare Gap.'

Former University of Louisville basketball coach and NCAA champion Rick Pitino owned a share of 2013 Kentucky Derby starter Goldencents. But instead of watching the race at Churchill Downs, Pitino spent the afternoon in a suite at Gulfstream surrounded by friends.

Since being rebuilt in the style of renowned architect Addison Mizner, Gulfstream has served as a backdrop for A&E's hit television show 'The Glades,' HBO's 'Ballers,' music videos for John Legend and Rick Ross, countless magazine shoots and parties hosted by the likes of Dennis Rodman and Alonzo Mourning.

A LEGACY OF GIVING BACK

Gulfstream Park's commitment to "giving back" to communities - through philanthropic partnerships, donations and outreach programs - endures today at the local and national levels through many diverse community initiatives.

Gulfstream's latest initiatives include:

- Funding the Gulfstream Park American Dream Scholarship at Broward College in perpetuity to help students in Broward, Miami-Dade or Palm Beach County who are 75 percent toward degree completion and have financial need.
- Canter for the Cause, which allows riders of all ages to trot or canter their horse across legendary Gulfstream to benefit Thoroughbred Aftercare
- Reading programs at several local schools in the area.
- Impact Fund for Veterans and Legends
- Ed Brown Society

Gulfstream has also held several events to raise awareness and funds for, among others, the Permanently Disabled Jockeys Fund, Thoroughbred Aftercare Program, Florida Thoroughbred Retirement and Adoptive Care (TRAC), Becca's Closet, Feeding South Florida, Best Buddies, Overtown Youth Center, The Pantry of Broward and Live, Love and Help Stephanie Schriefer. Gulfstream also continued its support of His Place Ministries, dedicated to the spiritual, emotional and life needs of all backstretch personnel at Gulfstream and Palm Meadows.

Gulfstream's annual giving program focuses on the needs of local charities as well as aiding caregivers responding to emergencies of the moment. At the same time, Gulfstream Park has been a major

contributor to the many charitable organizations in the larger equine community. The caring needs of the people who live and work in the world of Thoroughbred racing will not fade away. Nor will Gulfstream Park's charitable efforts diminish.

Over the past several years Gulfstream has raised and distributed more than \$1 million to local and national charitable organizations. Gulfstream has also started the Gulfstream Cares Outreach Booth to help local and national charities raise funds and awareness for their organizations during the Championship Meet.

In recent years, Gulfstream Park and its parent company, The Stronach Group, have endeavored to raise awareness and significant funds for several local charities including Joe DiMaggio Children's Hospital, Hallandale Beach PAL, Susan G. Komen For The Cure, After The Impact, Hospice Care, Zamar School of Performing Arts, Jockeys' Guild, Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation, The Exceller Fund, Memorial Foundation, Old Friends, American Cancer Society, the University of Florida (Barbaro Scholarship), and the Florida Horsemen's Charitable Foundation.

In March of 2011, just weeks after jockey Eibar Coa was injured in a spill, Gulfstream orchestrated a golf tournament and auction that raised more than \$50,000 to help Coa and his family with medical expenses and long-term rehabilitation. Gulfstream's philanthropic efforts in 2011 also helped to raise money and awareness for Florida Thoroughbred Retirement & Adoptive Care Program.

In January of 2010, Gulfstream not only contributed financially to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for crimes

against horses in South Florida, but management and employees raised more than \$10,000 for victims of a deadly earthquake in Haiti. A month later, officials from The Stronach Group, Forest City Commercial Development and Hallandale Beach gathered to make a two-year \$50,000 commitment to the Joe DiMaggio Children's Hospital Foundation.

Gulfstream Park has also worked closely with local law enforcement, volunteering to host a fundraiser in 2007 for the families of two police officers killed in the line of duty.

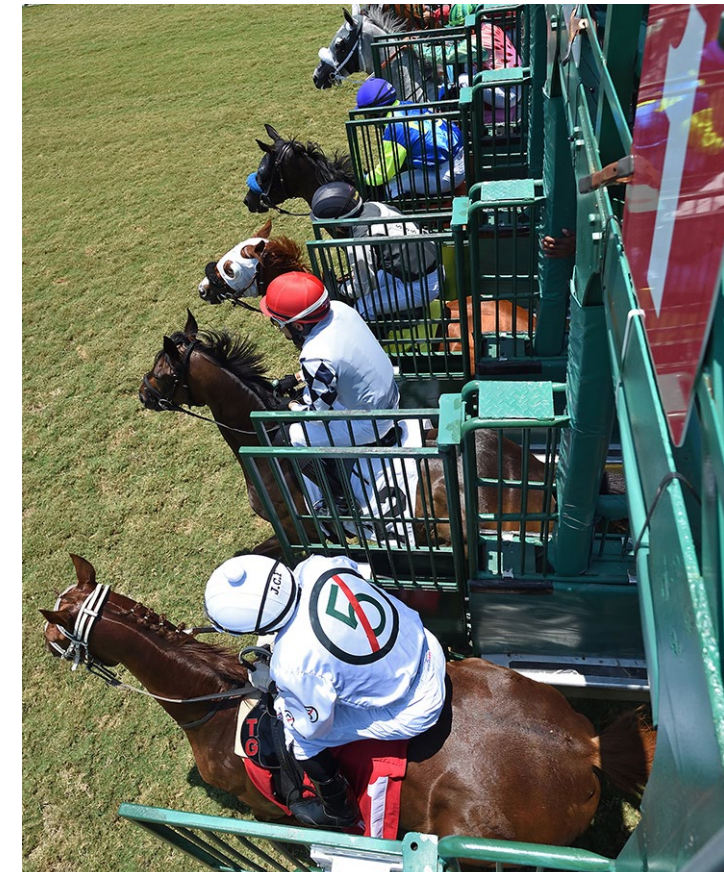

The FTHA’s mission and purpose is also to foster and encourage a healthier economic climate and a high level of public acceptance of the Florida Thoroughbred industry, to protect the safety of its members, their stable personnel and horses, and to work with all officials and representatives of Gulfstream Park, the Division of Pari-Mutuel Wagering and its departments and sub-divisions, and the public.

ABOUT THE FTBOA

The Florida Thoroughbred Breeders' and Owners' Association represents Thoroughbred breeders and owners who breed, raise, sell, train and race Florida Thoroughbreds.

Florida annually ranks second or third in annual foal production and is the perennial leading producer of Thoroughbred starters, winners, open stakes wins and graded stakes wins among U.S. regional markets.

Florida has produced more Kentucky Derby winners (six) than any other state or province outside of Kentucky including Needles (1956), Carry Back (1961), Foolish Pleasure (1975), Triple Crown winner Affirmed (1978), Unbridled (1990) and Silver Charm (1997). Florida far outdistances other regional markets with 30 Breeders' Cup winners, 19 winners of Triple Crown races, 66 national champions and 183 millionaire Thoroughbreds.

The FTBOA promotes Florida Thoroughbred breeding and racing through Florida-bred breeder and stallion awards, Florida-bred racing incentives, and the Florida Sire Stakes race series.

Breeder awards valued at up to 20% of gross purse are paid to the breeder of a Florida-bred registered with the FTBOA which finishes first, second or third in any race at a licensed Florida Thoroughbred racetrack. Stallion owners earn up to 20% of gross purse for Florida-sired winners in Florida black type stakes.

An annual highlight of the Florida-bred racing calendar, the FTBOA Florida Sire Stakes, distributes \$1.2 million in a six-race series for Florida-sired 2-year-olds. Several Florida-bred or Florida-sired stakes, such as Sunshine series of stakes at Gulfstream Park in January and the Florida Cup card at Tampa Bay Downs in March, benefit older horses.

The FTBOA incentive programs collectively distribute more than \$15 million each year, increasing up to \$20 million with the inclusion of Florida-bred Owner Awards (FOA) that are managed by the respective Florida racetracks and Thoroughbred



horsemens' associations. The combined Florida breeder, stallion and open race owner awards outpace all other states' incentive programs outside of Kentucky.

Florida Equine Communications, a wholly-owned subsidiary of FTBOA, produces the award-winning monthly magazine *The Florida Horse*; the Thoroughbred digest *Wire to Wire*; and the *The Florida Horse* podcast. FEC also handles the media relations, social media and internet marketing for the Association.

FEC media resides online at FTBOA.com alongside extensive FTBOA services such as real-time Florida-bred race entries and results, the Florida-bred registry search, Florida racing and breeding incentives administration, and FTBOA membership services. FEC products are perfectly posed for advertisers wishing to reach the more than \$3.24 billion Thoroughbred marketplace.

The FTBOA administers Florida Thoroughbred Charities, the charitable arm of the Florida Thoroughbred industry. Since 1990, FTC has strengthened and supported the community by raising more than \$4 million for charitable organizations within the Thoroughbred industry, the city of Ocala, Marion County and the state of Florida.

The FTBOA actively represents the Thoroughbred industry in community affairs, especially at the state and national governments.

EDGARD ZAYAS

BREAKAGE

The difference between the true mutuel-odds payoff and the actual payoff on the lesser, rounded amounts given to winning players.

CHURN

The amount of money wagered by a bettor during the course of one racing program.

COMMINGLED POOLS

The host track's collection of all simulcast wagering monies derived from receiving tracks.

DAILY DOUBLE

A single wager in which the bettor is required to select the winners of two designated, consecutive races.

EVEN-MONEY

If a horse returns twice what was wagered, the horse is said to have been "even-money."

EXACTA

A wager that requires the selection, in exact order, of the first and second horses in a race.

EXACTA BOX

For as little as \$1 per combination, bettors may "box" two or more horses in their exacta bets. For instance, a bettor could play a two-horse, \$1 exacta box with a combination of "2-4." This would cost \$2 and would be a winner if the #2 and #4 horses finished first and second, in either order.

INTERTRACK WAGERING (ITW)

Simulcasting that emanates from one track and is received by in-state pari-mutuel facilities.

INTERSTATE WAGERING (ISW)

Simulcasting that emanates from one track and is received by out-of-state pari-mutuel facilities.

KEYS

In exotics, this wager focuses on one horse played above or below a group of other horses. For instance, in an exacta key, if you like the 3, you may wish to place the 3 on top with all the others played for second. To key the 3 on top in a trifecta, you would ask that the 3 be played "with 'all,' with 'all.'"

MINUS POOL

Racetracks must pay off all winning bets and if the mutuel pool is insufficient, a minus pool is incurred and the racetrack must dip into its own pockets to pay the bet. On the rare occasion when this does occur it is typically in show bets.

MUTUEL POOL

The total amount bet to win, place and show and all exotic bets.

PART-WHEEL

Similar to a key, this wager differs only in that, instead of focusing on one horse, you play a group of horses above or below another group of horses.

PICK 3

The Pick 3 is a multiple-race bet whereby the bettor must select, on a single ticket, the winners of three consecutive, specially designated races. If there are no tickets with all three winners, the payoff pool is distributed among those bettors with two of the three winners.

PICK 4

The Pick 4 follows the same format as the Bet 3. The Pick 4 consists of the final four races on the card.

PICK 5

The Pick 5 offers a base wager of 50 cents and follows the same format as the Pick 4 with the exception that if no one holds a ticket with the winners of all five races, 25 percent of the day's pool is paid out to those with the most winners while 75 percent is carried over and added to the next racing day's pool. The Pick 5 sequence spans the final five races on a card.

RAINBOW 6

The Rainbow 6 is a 20-cent wager that requires the bettor to select the winners of the final six races on a card. The multi-race wager requires a bettor to hold the only ticket with all six winners in order for the Rainbow 6 jackpot to be paid out. If there are multiple tickets with all six winners or there are none with all six, 40 percent of the day's pool is paid out to those with the most winners and 60 percent is carried over to the next racing day.

ROLLING DOUBLES

A wager in which you are challenged to pick the winners of two consecutive races, beginning with the first and second races, then the second and third, and up to the penultimate and final race of the day.

SUPERFACTA

A wager requires the bettor to select, in exact order, the first four finishers of a designated race. For example a "4-5-10-2" superfecta ticket would be a winner only if the #4 horse won, the #5 horse ran second, the #10 horse was third and the #2 horse finished fourth. As with its exacta and trifecta counterparts, "boxing" with a \$1 base wager enables the bettor to play multiple combinations on the same ticket.

ROLLING SUPER HI-5

The Super Hi-5 offers a 50-cent base wager and requires the bettor to select the first five finishers of the designated race in exact order. Should no one hold a ticket with the first five finishers, 25 percent of the race's pool is paid out to those with the most placings in exact order while 75 percent is carried over to the next race.

TAKEOUT

The amount taken out of every dollar wagered before the payoffs on a given race are determined.

TRIFECTA

A trifecta wager requires the selection, in exact order, of the first-, second- and third-placed horses in a given race. For example, if the bettor purchases a trifecta combination of "2-4-11," then, in order to collect, the #2 horse must win, the #4 horse must be second and the #11 horse must finish third.

TRIFECTA BOX

If a bettor wishes to box three or more horses in the trifecta, and the selections finish one-two-three in any order, then the ticket is a winner. For example, if a bettor wishes to box horses #3, #5 and #7 in the trifecta, then the ticket will cover the following six combinations: 3-5-7, 3-7-5, 5-3-7, 5-7-3, 7-3-5, 7-5-3.

WIN, PLACE AND SHOW

A win bet requires that the bettor's horse finish first; a place bet requires the selected horse to finish first or second; a show bet means the chosen horse must finish first, second or third.

3 PICK YOUR BET

You can bet with a teller, at a 1/ST BET kiosk or on the 1/ST BET mobile app—it's up to you. If you're uncertain, visit one of our Racing Ambassadors at the Guest Service booth in the Breezeway.

Here's what you need:


1. Racetrack name and race number
2. The dollar amount of your wager
3. The type of bet (win, place, show, etc.)
4. The official number(s) of the horse(s) you've chosen

EXAMPLE

WHAT ARE ODDS?
Odds are the ratio of approximately how much you can expect to win versus how much money you're going to bet.

8-1 You'll win \$8 for every \$1 you wager

3-2 You'll win \$3 for every \$2 you wager



The horse with the lowest odds is the "favorite". It wins 35% of the time.

LEARN TO MAKE A BET IN 5 EASY STEPS

1. PICK THE TRACK TO WAGER ON
2. CHOOSE A RACE AND BET AMOUNT
3. DECIDE WHAT TYPE OF WAGER TO BET ON
4. SELECT YOUR HORSE(S)
5. PLACE YOUR BET

STRAIGHT BETS

WIN: You collect if your horse finishes first. **PLACE:** You collect if your horse finishes first or second. **SHOW:** You collect if your horse finishes first, second or third.

HOW TO COLLECT ON TRACK

Once the race is declared official, take your winning wager to any mutuel window. At that point you can decide to collect the full amount of your winnings or wager back all or part of it on upcoming races. If you are unsure of whether you've won, bring your ticket to any window to have it checked.

Avoid cashing your ticket 5 minutes before any race as many people wait until the last few minutes before a race to place their wagers, and cashing your winnings will slow the process.

ALLOWANCE RACE

A race featuring conditions for participation such as amount of money won or number of races won in a certain time period.

APPRENTICE

A rider who has not won five races is entitled to a 10-pound "allowance," which is to say his mount may carry 10 pounds less than the competition, and a seven-pound allowance until he has ridden an additional 30 winners; if he has ridden 35 winners prior to the end of one year from the date of riding his fifth winner, he shall have an allowance of five pounds until the end of that year. Also called a "bug" rider because an asterisk is often used in the program to denote apprenticeship.

BAY

The light brownish color of some horses' coats.

BLACK

The color of some horses.

BLINKERS

A hood with plastic cups surrounding the eye holes that restrict visibility, helping the horse to focus on what lies ahead by eliminating distractions from the sides.

BOBBLED

Horses can lose their action if they take a misstep while racing.

BREEDER

Owner of a pregnant mare at the time she delivers the foal (baby horse of either sex).

BREEDERS' CUP

Racing's international championship days, with 13 races offering prize money totaling \$24.5 million. The BC is annually held in late October or early November, changing venues from one year to the next, and attracts the world's best horses in training.

BROODMARE

A female horse out to pasture for breeding purposes; a broodmare sire is the sire, or father, of such a female.

BROWN

A dark brown color of some horses' coats.

CHECKED

Horses on occasion could be pulled up briefly if the horse in front of them slows down dramatically and there is nowhere for them to go.

CHESTNUT

Horse with a reddish-colored coat.

CHUTE

The extensions that break off from a typically oval racetrack that allow for races to be conducted at distances which, if begun on the oval, would begin on the turn and would thereby disadvantage horses who started on the outside.

CIRCUIT

A geographical grouping of tracks whose race meetings are coordinated to run in succession.

CLAIMING RACES

Races in which all horses entered are for sale. A "claimer" is a horse who runs in these races.

CLOCKERS

People who time, or clock, morning workouts; the time is taken in hundredths or in fifths of a second.

COLT

A male less than 5 years old who is capable of future service at stud.

CONDITION BOOK

A track-published pamphlet that contains rules and regulations of racing, and information on purses, weight assignments and terms of eligibility for every race at the meeting. They are free of charge and available at the racing office.

DAM

The mother of a horse.

DERBY

A race usually of considerable value for 3-year-old horses.

DOGS

Orange traffic cones that are used during workout hours to protect the inside part of a racetrack or turf course.

FILLY

A female 4 years old or less.

FURLONG

One-eighth of a mile, 660 feet or 220 yards.

GELDING

A horse whose testicles were removed often because of poor temperament and/or a growth disorder.

GRADED STAKES

A committee of racing authorities from across the nation rank stakes order of importance, according to a grading system based on the historic, overall quality of the horses that have competed in them. There are Grade 1, 2 and 3 races, with the lower the number the more prestigious the race.

GRAY

A horse with white hairs in his coat.

GROOM

The horse's caregiver, the person who "grooms" the horse, cleans its stall and often spends the most time with it.

HAND

A term used to measure the height of a horse, each hand being four inches.

HANDICAP

A race in which, based on past performance, the racing secretary assigns individual weights to horses in the hopes of creating an evenly matched race; good horses carry more weight; handicapping is the process by which that determination is made.

HANDICAPPER

A person, either a professional or amateur, who attempts to predict the outcome of a race.

HANDLE

The total amount of money wagered on a race, at a racetrack or at a simulcast center, or both.

HORSE

A horse is a horse of course, but, on the racetrack, a "horse" is a male 5 years old and older.

JOCKEY CLUB

Long-standing organization that approves thoroughbred names and keeps the registry known as the American Stud Book.

LEAD PONY

The horse who escorts thoroughbreds once they enter the racetrack.

LENGTH

The average body length of a running horse, usually about 10 feet, used to measure the margin of victory or defeat.

LONGSHOTS

The horses given the least chance to win a race; payoffs can be huge if they win.

MAIDEN SPECIAL WEIGHT

Races in which none of the participants have won a race; the participants are known as "maidens."

INQUIRY

The investigation of a race by the stewards, based on their own observations or the objection of a jockey or, on rare occasion, the trainer.

MARE

A female 5 years old or older.

OBJECTION

Usually registered by a jockey and or stewards, but occasionally by a trainer, this act touches off a stewards' investigation into the running of a race.

ODDS-ON

If a horse is so heavily favored that the payoff is less than equal to the amount wagered, the horse is said to be odds-on or an odds-on favorite.

OPTIONAL CLAIMING ALLOWANCE RACE

A race featuring conditions for participation such as amount of money won or number of races won in a certain time period. Horses entered for a claiming price are also eligible to compete.

OUTRIDER

The mounted person in charge of leading a field of horses to the track and through the post parade; he or she may also be called upon to catch loose horses.

OVERNIGHT RACE

A race in which entries are drawn 48 hours in advance. The phrasing goes back to the day when race entries were drawn the day before.

PADDOCK

The area where horses are saddled before a race.

POOLS

The total amount of money bet on each brand of wager, such as win pools, place pools, etc.

POSTS

The stalls in the starting gate from which a horse begins a race.



SADDLECLOTH

The piece of cloth placed under the saddle that bears the program number of a horse competing in a race.

SHEDROW

The pathway inside a barn.

SILKS

The colorful shirts, which represent a horse's owner(s), that jockeys wear during a race; also known as "colors."

SIRE

The father of a horse.

STABLE

An owner's racing enterprise.

STAKES

A race for top-quality horses. The race may specify the sex and age of its participants and further differentiated by a grading system whereupon Grade 1 stakes are of the top level, followed by Grade 2 and Grade 3 stakes, then by ungraded stakes races.

STALL

The horse's home while he is stabled at the racetrack.

STALLION

A male horse who is in service at a breeding farm.

POST PARADE

The formal presentation of the field of horses before each race; after leaving the walking ring they are paraded before the grandstand and clubhouse, typically about 10 minutes before each race.

POST TIME

The time when a race is scheduled to start.

PURSE

The money value of a race.

RESTRICTED RACES

Races limited to only particular horses, for instance, those bred in a particular state.

ROAN

See Gray/Roan
