Race 2: I'm hoping the white-hot run of trainer Bobby Dibona continues with Tiz Possible Dear in this full field of older filly & mare claimers. Tiz Possible Dear is getting a tad of good old fashioned class relief and is also starting for a barn that is three for their last six here at Gulfstream over the last 30 days. Indeed, the second half of this GP winter season has been a good one for Dibona, who over the last couple of months has, quietly I might add, compiled a nine-for-26 record, good for a strike rate of 35%. Here's hoping this Prospective mare with Hall of Famer Edgar Prado up adds to those outstanding numbers.

Race 3: Pardon My Heart is very likely to pull the same kind of rail-skimming trip she did last out beneath Luis Saez. Sunday, however, hopefully presents her with a tad better racing luck off the far turn. For the record, Pardon My Heart will have her hooves full in this spot considering she knocks heads again with Tizahra – they exit the same Mar. 6 field – and the Bill Mott-trained Ocean Fire, who is 0-1-4 from seven starts but seemingly right there in her races. For me, though, Pardon My Heart is a bet-back as I really liked her run here on Jan. 19 – she finished a narrow third behind Elizabeth Way, who went on to become a Grade 3 winner and was set to compete Florida Derby Day in the Grade 3 Orchid for Hall of Famer Roger Attfield. As for her last start, Pardon My Heart had a great rail tracking trip up until the top of the stretch when Elle M'a Souri ranged up outside and did not let Pardon My Heart into the clear. I don't think Pardon My Heart would have beaten Take Ten (who has gotten really good of late for Mark Hennig) but she would have been closer had she cleared outside. Tizahra, meanwhile, ran very well in her half-length defeat for Ian Wilkes and is a big candidate to move forward here Sunday. Consider this: Tizahra was making only her second start – and first over the turf – since late last June. Let's see how she does beneath Chris Landeros from post 2.
